

Reading

- a Bed and breakfast (B and B) is a kind of holiday accommodation. Private houses offer a bed for the night and breakfast in the morning. B and Bs do not usually offer other meals. Guests have their breakfast in the dining room or in their bedroom. The owners usually prepare the breakfast and clean the room. B and Bs are not very expensive. A bed and breakfast has only got a few rooms. There are B and Bs in big cities, villages and in seaside towns. In the USA, there are 'floating' B and Bs: the rooms are on a boat or houseboat.
- **b** A **studio flat** (UK) or studio apartment (USA) is a small flat with a living room, bedroom and kitchen; a studio flat has its own bathroom.
- **c** A **youth hostel** is a place where people, especially young people can stay very cheaply. It is a low budget form of accommodation. You usually sleep in a bunk bed, in a dormitory with other guests and share the bathroom, lounge and sometimes the kitchen. Single or double rooms are also sometimes available. Hostels are ideal places for people who like to socialise with other travellers.

- d Some visitors to the UK now sleep on people's couches or sofas. This type of accomodation is called 'couch surfing'. They move from one friend's house to another, sleeping in the spare space available on the floor or on a couch. Couch surfers usually stay for a few days, then they move on to the next house.
- e The word 'bedsit' or bed-sitting room comes from 'bedroom' and 'sitting room'. A bedsit is a single room for rent, with a bed, table, chairs, wardrobe and small kitchen. People in bedsits usually share the bathroom and toilet with other lodgers. Bedsits are cheap and they are popular with students and young, single people. In 'bedsit land' (a part of a big city) people live alone and they often do not know their neighbours. In the USA, they call bedsits 'single room occupancy'.
- f Many students at British universities stay in small rooms in big blocks called **Halls of Residence**. They share the kitchen but usually have their own bathrooms.
